### Tell us a little bit about yourself and your team.

I oversee the catering department for Dame Allan's. My team spans both the Junior School and Senior Schools sites, catering for children from age 3 to 18.

I'm from a mainly hospitality background and have worked all over the world, such as Australia and South America, working at several locations within the Malmasion and Holiday Inn brands as well as Operations at the Alnwick Gardens.

I chose to work in education when I did my degree at Leeds Met University where nutrition and food standards for education became of great interest to me. I went on to be recognised by the BBC for my catering that was based on using local suppliers and farms - this is still something I am

very passionate about and would like to do more of this with the amazing team we have at Dame Allan's Schools.

My team comes from a wealth of backgrounds; some of them come from the best North East independent restaurants and highend chains, and bring valuable experiences such as patisserie and front of house, and some have been here at Dame Allan's for over 20 years so are finetuned to how life at Dame Allan's works. Both aspects are equally as valuable in running a successful catering department.

#### Some of the ways we run Dame Allan's has changed since the outbreak of COVID-19. What's been the biggest challenge to your department?

Reducing the offer has been harder than you'd think as trying to gauge what pupils will go for on a day to day basis is a bit like picking the lottery numbers! Many suppliers completely shut down during the lockdown period so getting supplies isn't quite as straightforward as it

has been and we have often had to change ingredients and menu items to accommodate these issues

Often making more of one item is pretty restrictive as we simply don't have the space to facilitate cooking that amount, such as our roasts or fresh fish, in one day. Catering for over 1000 children with such a broad spectrum of tastes, dietary requirements and personal choice is really difficult to reduce down!

### And what are you most proud of over the last six months?

I'm most proud of how my teams at both sites have pulled together and risen to the challenges we face in these forever changing situations, and even more so how our pupils have adapted to the situation - I feel they are the ones facing the biggest changes and have seemed to cope extremely well.

## How does this differ from what you had planned for the 2020-21 academic year?

This year was supposed to be about changing the menus with

the seasons and using more local suppliers and produce. Historically the menus stay the same through the whole year, but I'd like to see the menu naturally change along the way throughout the year. We also had a great backbone of ideas from both the Junior and Senior Schools pupils which we very much wished to implement, but with the forever changing situations that arise from the COVID-19 outbreak we have just had to simplify the offer - not only down to resources but also from a practical sense.

# It looks like we'll be living with these socially-restricted circumstances for a little while longer. What are you putting in place for the future?

I'd like to think that we will be able to once again offer the full options that our pupils have become used to as the pupils get used to the new way of lunch in their 'bubbles'. Hopefully, as supplies resume to a more normal level, we can then go back to our initial plans that we had for the beginning of the year - to follow the seasons to get the produce at its best.

# Exams delay

The Department of Education has announced their plans for summer 2021 examinations.

Examination series: 7 June - 2 July
A Level Results Day: Tuesday 24 August
GCSE Results Day: Friday 27 August

Following on from the government's announcement, a letter has been sent out to parents of pupils in Years II and I3, further information will be provided in due course. However, please note that a Contingency Day has not yet been published so we strongly advise not booking holidays for early July to ensure there are no clashes with the potential back-up dates.

The senior management team and Heads of Departments are all in agreement that pupils are in a strong position going into this examination year. Thanks to our online provision during lockdown and distance learning, pupils were already on track to complete the course so this additional three weeks will allow for further revision. All departments are providing additional sessions over lunchtime should students feel they need extra support or guidance.
