In conversation with... Leela Stedman, HR Manager.



Tell us about yourself and the Schools' HR department:

I've worked in HR for 15 years and joined DAS in December 2020 as the HR Manager for both schools. This is my first time working in education and I've been fortunate to be supported by two fantastic members of the HR team - Amy Boyle and Liz O'Sullivan, who has since retired.

I handle the day-to-day HR services, but also strive to create, encourage and drive a culture where staff are motivated and developed, in order to achieve their very best and maximise performance. HR has come a long way from its original perception of personnel!

Wellbeing and employee satisfaction of staff are so important. I believe that passionate, happy people are the best kind of people to have in an organisation.

As an employer, DAS encourages a supportive environment and provides many resources for its staff.

I think the school environment naturally encourages development of qualities such as self-discipline, confidence and independence, whilst creating a community culture in which members care and support each other. HR plays a vital part in influencing the organisational culture and ensures that all staff are well suited to the organisation and strive to complement it.

What challenges have you faced in your role?

Having worked previously in the industrial sector, I do enjoy the challenges that the education sector brings - with a different focus on areas such as safeguarding, and the recruitment and development of staff.

Recruitment is a very difficult, candidate-driven market at the moment for many organisations. While teaching staff are easier to recruit for, we do struggle to find the right support staff. So, it means focusing our efforts with targeted campaigns to reach those audiences that might not necessarily consider working within a school.

How has the pandemic impacted HR?

It has been a challenging time for everyone, but staff have been fantastic in their management both during lockdown and back at school.

Our aim is to positively support and encourage staff to be open and honest about the daily stresses and pressures they face. We are acutely aware that there may be long term effects as a result of the past 18 months. That said, DAS staff are amazing at remaining positive and focussed on providing the very best outcomes for the students.

On a personal note, it's great to now start seeing and meeting staff face-toface without masks, as getting to know people is so important in my role.

What has been a highlight of your job?

I started mid-academic year last December, so getting to see all the preparation that goes into the start of the new academic year in September was exciting.

I'm also enjoying meeting the many new members of staff after months of recruiting, and have more of an appreciation of all the training involved. We are getting new projects underway, such as the implementation of professional reviews for the development of support staff.

There are many benefits and perks to working here - the school dinners are amazing to name one, as well as the actual environment. I feel proud walking around both schools.

Restart A Heart

Our fantastic school nurse Mrs Proctor has been teaching students (and staff!) how to save a life, with assemblies on the importance of early CPR and defibrillation on a person suffering a cardiac arrest.

Mrs Proctor, who came to Dame Allan's in 2017 after 11 years working in Newcastle's emergency department, spoke to the Boys' and Girls' Schools about the 'Chain of Survival' ahead of 'Restart A Heart' day on October 16th.

"I'm passionate about teaching children CPR," she said. "I hope that by encouraging them not to be afraid to step up and help, alongside the greater availability of community defibrillators, then survival rates of those suffering from out-of-hospital cardiac arrests will improve."

There is one defibrillator at the Senior School and another at the Junior School.

It was wonderful to welcome back old Allanian and political writer Sebastian Payne last month to regale us with tales of his time here at Dame Allan's and talk to sixth formers and staff about his fascinating career and new book, Broken Heartlands: A journey through Labour's Lost England.

Book Binge



Pupils who took part in the Summer Book Binge enjoyed a celebratory breakfast in the Library recently, with prizes and House Points for their fantastic efforts.

Some 27 students read an incredible 210 books between them over the summer holiday - 23 pupils read 8 or more books to receive a Gold award and certificate, two pupils read 6-7 books to take Silver, and two pupils read 3-5 books to achieve Bronze.

Raising Awareness

A huge thank you to the girls from IIJ who collected £175 through a bake sale and raised awareness of period poverty in Newcastle.

They donated the money to Smart Works, a volunteer-run charity that helps local women get back into work. The charity works closely with more than

100 referral agencies across the region, such as mental health charities, homeless shelters and women's refuges, and gives practical support to women including packs of beauty and sanitary goods.



Noughts and Crosses

More than 50 Upper School students auditioned for a role in their upcoming play, and rehearsals are now starting for what promises to be a powerful production of Noughts and Crosses.

The bitter-sweet love story of Sephy, a politician's daughter, and rebel Callum, tells of two young people kept apart by bigotry, terrorism and injustice. Their desire to be together threatens family loyalties and sparks a growing political crisis.

The play, adapted from Malorie Blackman's best-selling novels, by arrangement with Nick Hern Books, has already been studied by GCSE drama students as part of the curriculum.



Tickets will go on sale in January for performances on February 10th, 11th, and 12th.

Competitive Comeback



Competitive sports fixtures have returned to the pitches outside Dame Allan's Schools this term and we have celebrated some fantastic performances across all year groups.

In hockey, Junior teams have played against Mowden Hall and Durham School, while Senior teams have taken on RGS Newcastle, Austin Friars and Yarm. The first round of House Hockey Matches took place on 9 October.

The u14 and u16 girls' hockey teams remained unbeaten in all their preliminary matches of the National Schools Hockey competition and now progress to the regional finals at Durham University.

In rugby, every boy in Years 7, 8 and 9 represented the school in festivals versus Kings and RGS Newcastle, while the 1st XV celebrated a 36-7 victory against Durham in the Schools Vase competition.

In cross country, there were some fantastic performances from those in the Junior School at Mowden Hall, with special mention to runners who placed: Year I boys - Ethan Ray (Ist) and Logan Barlow (2nd); Year 2 boys - Daniel Harrison (2nd) and Edward Huntley (3rd); Year 2 girls - Freya Rudge (Ist); and Year 6 boys - Nick Surtees-Brown (Ist).

We have also seen a return of the squash club at The Northumberland Club, in Jesmond, and the first round of the National Schools Finals, as well as netball and basketball fixtures.
