

Careers guidance from 'play-level to A Level'



PUPILS throughout the Schools benefited from the advice and guidance of many inspiring Allanians, parents, and business leaders who volunteered their time during another hugely successful careers week.

Regional director of the CBI, Sarah Glendinning; astrophysicist, Aine O'Brien; North East filmmaker and director, Krishna Muthurangu; and GP, Dr Georgina Cassie, were among alumni who kindly returned to Dame Allan's to share a wealth of experience, insight and information with pupils of all ages.

Many presentations, assemblies and workshops were planned for National Careers Week bolstering the continuous work being done to offer varied and informative career guidance to pupils throughout their time at school.

Bel Whitehouse, Head of Careers at Dame Allan's, said great careers advice is vital from 'play-level to A Level' to ensure pupils are ready for the world of further and higher education, and employment.

She said: "It's our job to open their eyes to the many opportunities available to them - to ensure they are never limited or held back when it comes to considering a future career. We proactively keep our career guidance as diverse and inspiring as possible, and we purposefully start at a very early age, and never really take our foot off the accelerator!"

The Schools fulfil the eight Gatsby benchmarks of good career guidance - offering a structured careers programme for all pupils, linking curriculum learning to careers, incorporating 'Find Your Future' activities into form time and PSHE education, and supporting work experience placements.

Career Ambassadors are appointed annually from Year 10 through to Year 13, and these students are responsible for mentoring younger students with GCSE choices, meeting and greeting visitors, and supporting the various employer events throughout the academic calendar.

In March, Year 11s benefited from work experience mock interviews. Retired paediatrician Geoff Lawson, Performing Arts student Matthew Bell, Junior School Head Geoff Laidler and retired Deputy Head Bill Lomas were among the many Allanians who came to help interview pupils. Other representatives included the NHS, Coop, HMRC, the Institute of Chemistry, Willmott Dixon Construction, Credit Suisse, Universities and DfE Apprenticeship Service. Other alumni who returned to support the event included trainee solicitors lenny Wilkes and Charlotte Gunn, designer Sabrina Oubinova, aerospace engineer Charlotte Keenan, teacher Sadaf Chaudry, meteorologist Eleanor Pinches and her brother Edward, a senior science communications officer.

Thanks should also go to the many parents who came to talk to Junior School pupils as part of the "Day in the Life of..." programme. These included Allanians, Dr David Ng, an emergency consultant at Northumbrian Specialist Emergency Care Hospital, and Jason Cook, a comedian and television writer.

Mrs Whitehouse, who spoke at the Westminster Forum, in London, on the importance of careers provision throughout all year groups, added: "Our alumni are a fantastic, powerful support for our present students. We are so grateful to those who return to the Schools to inspire future generations and help all pupils, from play-level to A Level, to realise the wealth of career possibilities available to them."

Juniors take tour of North End Development



A GROUP of Year 6 pupils were given a special tour of the North End Development and learnt about its construction as part of National Careers Week.

Ten pupils from Dame Allan's Junior School visited the Senior School site to be shown around the £8m development by Gateshead-based contractors Tolent, now the steel framework is complete.

Dressed in high-vis jackets, hard hats and gloves, they walked around the perimeter of the construction site and learnt about the various contractors working on the large-scale development.

Junior School headteacher Geoff Laidler said: "It's been really exciting for the children to

see first-hand how the Senior School facilities are transforming, and learn about how this fantastic new building is being constructed."

The North End Development will see the creation of a large art department and 16 new classrooms, including three high-tech science laboratories and a suite of rooms for Modern Foreign Languages.

Principal Will Scott added: "The project is moving at a great pace and now the steels are up we are really seeing the building take shape. This is such a significant and exciting development in the history of the Schools, and it's nice to see how enthusiastic our younger pupils are about using it when they join the Senior School in September."

Charity thanks

Magnificent performance

TALENTED Upper School pupils delighted audiences three nights in a row with their powerful and moving production of Noughts and Crosses.

The play followed the bitter-sweet love story of politician's daughter Sephy (played by Olamiji, Year II) and rebel Callum (Joshua, Year II), kept apart by bigotry, terrorism and injustice.

Noughts and Crosses - adapted from Malorie Blackman's best-selling novels, by arrangement with Nick Hern Books - is a set text for drama GCSE, and pupils felt strongly about the many themes it explores: racism, inequality, friendship and hope.

Isla and Emma, both Year 13, were brilliant assistant directors and stage managers.

Together with Kate in Year 10, they ran the production on the nights.

Head of Drama, Kristy Clark, said the cast put on a "magnificent performance."

"We have an exceptionally talented number of pupils in the Schools, and, despite the tragic nature of the play, directing it has been a delight due to the enthusiasm of our cast and crew," she said. "The limitations of the past two years have deprived the pupils of the experience of staging full-scale productions and, for many of our cast members, this is the first project of this kind they have ever been involved in. "They have been professional throughout, and grown into an extremely supportive and cohesive ensemble, who have been a joy to work with."







In conversation with.... Lee Kesson, Exams Officer



Tell us about your role:

One of the biggest misconceptions is that I only have work to do in May and June! In reality, while those two months are exceptionally busy, administering exams is a year-round task.

The day-to-day job depends very much on the time of year: in September through to February there is a lot of planning and some training, between December and March the focus is also on exam entries, and in the pre-exam period to May there is a lot of preparation, including the creation of timetables and the handling of confidential exam material.

Naturally, May and June tend to be the months I'm the first to arrive at school and one of the last to leave! The exam period is demanding and it's important everything runs smoothly. I have a team of eight invigilators who come in to supervise exams and I'm also dealing with inspection visits, special consideration and the despatch of papers.

The cycle finishes when I receive and issue exam results from the Awarding Bodies in August, then issue certificates and deal with post-results enquiries. Of course, in addition to external exams, I also handle the internal exams for Years 11, 12, and 13 in January and February, and run some University Entrance Exams in November.

Covid must have had a huge impact?

Working in a role that has very clearly defined black and white rules and regulations has meant that the past two years have been unprecedented for exams. New rules were being made by the government 'on the hoof' and often I'd hear of changes at the same time as students, parents and teachers.

I had to train on new systems to gather attainment data and, although students were not able to gain a true exam experience, they were able to achieve good results to move on to the next stage of their education.

What about now, are we back to normal?

We are getting there. A number of concessions have been made by the Awarding Bodies to recognise the disruption to learning and as a contingency, schools have still had to prepare for 'no-exams', in addition to preparing students for real exams this summer. However, I am hopeful and confident that they will go ahead, my team is trained up and ready to greet students into the exam halls this summer.

So, things are about to get busy?

Yes! It's not just Year 11 and 13 pupils who feel the impact of exams on school life, everyone is aware of their importance. To accommodate exams, I take over the Newsom Hall and several classrooms, teachers assist in exam supervision and pupils need to remember that when moving around school they avoid disrupting exams. My role is central to the success of examinations and subsequent results, and I enjoy rising to the challenge each time!

Of course, receiving an education at Dame Allan's is much more than just exam results and it's nice to be involved in other areas of school life. I was a Royal Navy reservist for 19 years, which included active service in the Middle East during the 2003 Iraq War, and working here has allowed me to don the uniform and be a member of the Schools' Royal Marines CCF contingent.

A weekly dose of happiness!



WEEKLY 'Wellbeing Wednesday' sessions and a furry new member of the Junior School pastoral care team are helping to promote positive mental health awareness among our younger pupils.

Teachers are using dedicated class time each week to focus on mental wellbeing and happiness, and to give pupils a chance to discuss their feelings, thoughts and emotions in a supportive environment.

The Junior School has also introduced Zumos - an online platform that provides support and resources to help improve the resilience, self-confidence and happiness of its users -

for pupils to use daily, both in the classroom and at home.

Alongside these measures, 8-year-old Border Terrier Poppy has joined the pastoral care team and attends each Wednesday to support pupils and enrich their learning environment.

Deputy head and Poppy's owner, Deborah Farren, said: "We recognise the importance of promoting positive mental health from a young age, and that means utilising as many tools as possible - be it an online resource, a group wellbeing session or on a one-on-one walk with Poppy - to help pupils have an awareness of their own feelings, and the ability to express them."

Many of our Year 12 and 13 students volunteer as part of Dame Allan's extracurricular community service programme. It allows them to gain experience while giving back to their local community.

Two future medics Andrew and Molly give their time to Gosforth-based Café Beam, run by Smile for Life Children's Charity, and support young people with various disabilities and learning difficulties.

Molly, who is taking A Levels in Biology, Chemistry and Maths, helps café workers to take orders and serve customers. She said: "It's such a great opportunity not just as work experience, but to expand my awareness and understanding of working in a team of people with differing needs.

"I think this is a particularly important stepping stone towards medicine as it involves helping and taking responsibility for others, while also improving my communication skills in a work environment."


Andrew, who is taking A Levels in Biology, Chemistry and Economics, helps workers to develop key skills. He commented: "Volunteering supported my university application to study medicine, but I enjoy my time there so much I want to continue working at Café Beam for as long as possible."

Aspiring microbiologist Eve chose to volunteer in the healthcare sector and secured a community service placement in the NHS with the Grove Medical Group, in Gosforth.

She gives her time to help people referred to Meet and Move, a rehabilitation group for those recovering after a fall or operation, and suffering from a general loss of mobility. She joins weekly sessions led by a physiotherapist and helps attendees with muscle-strengthening exercises.

"Volunteering has not only developed my social skills, but also really opened my eyes to how the pandemic has affected the elderly and more vulnerable," said Eve, who is taking A Levels in Chemistry, Biology and Geography.





"That's further strengthened my desire to work in the field of microbiology and be part of the next generation battling against disease and illness."

Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

Fake news - what does it mean?

It is a fact that many pupils are exposed to information on the internet and within social media that may not be true, fair or accurate. It is increasingly difficult for young people to interpret such information appropriately and it can have detrimental effects if it is taken as received wisdom, believed and then disseminated further.

Fake news (false or heavily edited information), disinformation (false information deliberately created usually to harm individuals or groups) and misinformation (false information accidentally shared or created) as well as conspiracy theories (involving a combination of the above) are widely available on many platforms open to young people.

Platforms to be aware of

Social media platforms are, of course, great ways for young people to interact but can also be dangerous if used without privacy settings and appropriate supervision.

A popular platform is "Discord" which aims to link people with similar interests. Please note that the Apple recommended age rating for Discord is 17+ but it is still possible for under 17's to register and use the platform. We know from anecdotal evidence here at school that it is primarily used by those in the lower school. Sites which need no personal information to 'connect' with other users at all are particularly prolific in terms of the spreading of 'fake news' and conspiracy theories. 4 Chan is probably the most popular of these and is easily accessible by young people who are taking much of what is said on these sites as fact; much of which has its basis in extreme right wing, racist, and sexist ideology.
