A Greener Futures Fair



OUR annual Futures Fair, which helps hundreds of pupils realise the countless opportunities available to them after they leave school, was another huge success.

Forty representatives from companies, organisations, trusts and charities throughout the region, together with 18 Further/Higher Education institutes and apprenticeship providers, attended the popular fair to offer advice and guidance to pupils from Years 7 to 13.

The Futures Fair had a 'Go Green' theme this year, with exhibitors and speakers sharing their eco-policies and addressing environmental issues.

We were delighted to welcome Northumberland Wildlife Trust and Urban Green Newcastle, as well as the Co-op, whose representatives spread the message about recycling soft plastics.

Dr Georgina Sowman, a GP and a lead member of the RCGP Climate and Ecological Emergency advisory group, gave a fascinating talk on the impact of healthcare on the climate, and, in keeping with the theme, guests were treated to a sustainable gift pack, with reusable eco cup, recycled pen and pack of bee-friendly 'Seeds of Gratitude'.

A number of Allanians came to give inspirational career talks to older pupils in Years 10 to 13, including filmmaker Krishna Muthurangu, Director of The Deli Film Company, Jenny Wilkes, a solicitor at Womble Bond Dickinson, Ella Hughes, a First Class BA (Hons) Interior Architecture graduate who works at GT3 Architects, and Dr Georgina Cassie, a GP at the Forum Family Practice, in Cramlington.

Dr Cassie (Class of 1993) spoke to those interested in the field of medicine about both the challenges and the job satisfaction in her line of work. Sharing her top tips, she said: "My advice to all pupils is to be open to every opportunity that comes their way; to keep learning and to listen to the people around them, because experience is everything; and to look after their mental health."

Miss Wilkes (Class of 2013), a solicitor specialising in agriculture, farms and estates, spoke to pupils about the different routes into law and the availability of apprenticeship schemes. The talented footballer, who played at an elite level as a teenager, said: "My top tip to pupils is to continue with co-curricular activities because, not only do they gain transferable skills, but those activities they do alongside their studies are the things future employers want to talk to them about at interview."

Allanians Andy Bolland, of high-performance digital company Attraqt, and Nick White, of Graham Construction, had stands in the 'STEM' zone of the fair, alongside Professor Matt Boyle OBE, Executive Chair of Driving the Electric Revolution Innovation Centre and Chair of the North East Automotive Alliance, who gave a presentation to inspire the engineers of the future.

With some pupils travelling abroad over the coming week - on sports trips to Holland and Northern Ireland, a languages visit to Spain, and the history and politics trip to New York and Washington DC - I hope everyone has an enjoyable Lord Mayor's holiday on Friday and a restful half term break.

NHS Northumbria Healthcare had a popular stand on the day, with resources from its state-of-the-art simulation hub (DASH) at Wansbeck Hospital, including an augmented reality headset that was able to teach users about the human skeleton.

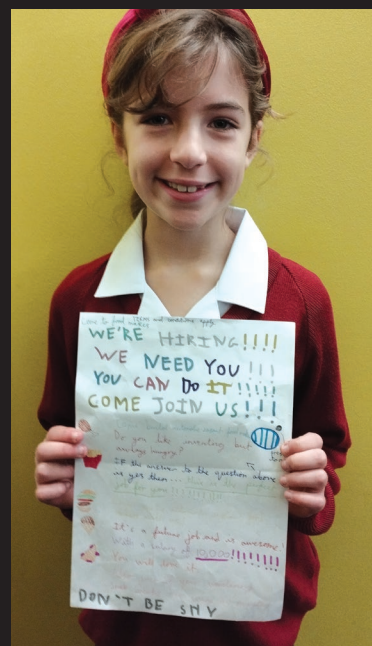

In conversation with.... Katherine Leonard, Development Officer



Tell us about your role:

The Development Office works to build relationships, to strengthen the Schools' community and support their mission to provide the best education to every pupil, regardless of background.

It's much more than fundraising - though that is very important. It's also about building links with our community and enabling alumni to stay connected with one another and the Schools.

Day to day, I might be speaking with a donor about how best to use their gift; making arrangements for an Allanian to visit to talk with pupils; or organising a reunion event. It's a busy and varied role, and I enjoy that.

A much-loved member of staff who has remained steadfastly committed to the '24/7 role', Mr Kirkbride chose to wait until the completion of the Jubilee Building before saying goodbye to the Schools.

"It was really important for me to oversee such an important and impressive build and see it through to the end," he said. "It's been a crazy year with a lot of moving - out of the old building, into the temporary portacabins and storage, and then into the new development - but it's rewarding to finally see the Jubilee Building being used and enjoyed; I feel very proud."

Mr Kirkbride has overseen many other developments during his years at the

Schools, most notably the creation of the Junior School and Nursery, as well as the refurbishment of the library, and work on the reception, food tech room, DT centre, drama room, labs 12, 13 and S6, and the new music room.

"I've loved seeing the school grow and thrive, it has given me so much job satisfaction," he said.

He admitted: "It's a 24/7 role that never stops... I even got a call one Christmas morning about a technical fault!"

"I'm proud to be an Allanian - to be part of a school community with such a unique and warm, friendly feel," said Mr Kirkbride.

WRITER Ian La Frenais - creator of some of the most iconic comedy shows on television including *Porridge*, *The Likely Lads* and *Auf Wiedersehen, Pet* - returned to Dame Allan's where he was a pupil in the '50s, to inspire some of the Schools' budding creative writers.

The writer, who now lives in LA, spoke fondly of his time at school. "Growing up in Whitley Bay and my happy schooldays at Dame Allan's defined me as a person. While I live and work in the 'craziness' that is Hollywood, the values I hold dear are rooted in my upbringing," he said.

Born in Monkseaton, La Frenais went to primary school in Whitley Bay before attending Dame Allan's Boys' School, where he was a keen rugby player and often involved backstage in theatre productions. During the visit he was taken on a tour of the school's Fenham site by Sixth Form pupils Arwen and Annabel, and shown the new Jubilee Building.

"It's great to come back. While some of the original buildings look physically the same on the outside, it's incredible to see the transformation inside and be shown the new development, with its fantastic space for art," he said.

Clubs should actively welcome questions about their activities and policies and have information on demand.
