Why do you think Dame Allan's has done so well in this year's Sunday Times Parent Power guide?

Our position of North East Independent School of the Year on the Sunday Times Parent Power Guide is a strong reflection of our overall school offering and our commitment to pupil achievement and wellbeing. This is something which has benefitted us greatly throughout the disruption of the Covid-19 pandemic and continues to be a strong aspect of our school life.

Throughout the past two years we have focused on minimising disruption to learning as much as possible and continuing to offer our excellent teaching and pastoral care through remote learning, the use of chromebooks and our distinctive diamond structure.

Pupils and parents thoroughly enjoyed the first two fascinating talks in our new lecture series... and excitement is mounting in anticipation of Dragons' Den star Sara Davies' visit next term.

The Lectures launched in October with a motivational speech delivered by internationallyrenowned speaker Marcus Child, who brought a tangible energy to the Newsom Hall as he discussed the importance of positive self-belief and setting goals.

Last month, leading behavioural economist and author Roger Martin-Fagg gave an in depth talk to a broad mix of pupils in Years 9 - 13 about the many factors influencing the economy, and highlighted the important influence that 'techsavvy and innovative' younger generations will have on future economic growth. The programme of inspirational talks will continue in the New Year, with BBC Dragon and former Strictly Come Dancing star Sara Davies MBE - a well-known entrepreneur who founded Crafter's Companion at just 21 years of age - booked to come in on February 16.

Allanian, professor Ruth Gregory, a notable mathematician and physicist who specialises in the field of cosmology, will come back to school to give her presentation on March 23.

The Lectures programme is backed by fellow Allanian Mark Dolder, who has chosen to 'give back' to Dame Allan's Schools and help inspire the next generation of business leaders, entrepreneurs and creative talent.

He said: "If anyone in the audience thinks bigger, aims higher, or exceeds the expectations they have set for themselves as a result of hearing our speakers, then the project will have been a roaring success!"

Spanning a varied vocal range, the boys sing from tenor to baritone to bass, and enjoy singing a variety of genres and styles. Dominic performed the song 'Oh how lovely was the evening' for his audition and Savile sang 'Be Prepared' from the Lion King, which he performed in last year.

The next step on this journey will be the NYC residential next summer in Harrogate which the boys are all looking forward to. This is the first step on a long journey that can often culminate in performances as part of BBC Proms at the Royal Albert Hall and international tours.

Congratulations to Tom and Holly, in Year 12, who have both been selected to play in Northumberland County u18s squads, and well done to our u14s who made it to the last 32 of the Schools Cup.

There have also been some excellent games played on the hockey pitches. Well done to the u16s, who won the North East Sub Area T3 finals, and to the u15s, who reached the final of the Northumberland County Hockey Tournament and drew I-I after shuffles against RGS. The uI5s are also through to the last round of the ISHC Plate, while the uI3 squad is through to the quarter finals in its age group. Congratulations to Poppy who has been selected onto England Hockey's Durham Talent Academy. Runners have continued to impress this term, with our Inter Girls and Senior Girls teams both competing at the ESAA Cross Country Cup regional finals. Senior Girls finished 4th by four points, narrowly missing out on a place in the national finals, while Inter Girls finished 3rd and secured a place. The cup final took place earlier this month and the girls finished a very respectable 19th in the country.

In other sport, the u14 basketball team won their pool of the Tyneside Cup competition, beating both Ponteland High and St Cuthbert's, and will play Whickham in the final in the New Year. The u16 girls' netball team won the National Schools county rounds and will represent the North East in the regional finals in January.

Members of our popular Karate Club had their grading exams in November, with eleven students examined for Kyu grades. Well done to all who took part, particularly those six pupils who achieved a first class grading.





Daniel's success

Congratulations to Daniel, in Year 10, who has been awarded a top grade 9 in his SCIP (School Certificate in Philosophy), for his impressive project work researching and writing about: 'Can suicide be morally justified?'

An SCIP is a Level 2 qualification (the equivalent to half a GCSE) that allows pupils to begin the study of philosophy as a subject at school. Year 9 pupils are taught the history of philosophy and debating theories in Religious and Philosophical Studies (RPS) lessons and given the opportunity to complete an SCIP project in Philosophy Club.

In conversation with... Rebecca Miller, Head of Admissions and Communications.



Tell us about your role and the wider department.

We look after families from the moment they consider Dame Allan's Schools to the day they leave... and even beyond that, as we continue to celebrate and share their successes over the years.

There are four of us in the department, each with a different skill set and area of expertise. Kate is the Admissions Officer and, together, we look after all admissions, from nursery through to Sixth Form.

Adam Clark is the Marketing and Events Officer, and he works with me on the Schools' advertising campaigns, and the marketing of various events, including the all-important open mornings.

Lucy has recently joined us as Senior PR and Communications Officer, and her role will be to produce the Digest content, manage our social media accounts, and share all the good news stories from across the Schools and the wider Dame Allan's community.

In admissions, you must be the first person a parent encounters.

Yes. Right from that initial enquiry, Kate and I are there to manage a family's application and assessment, and ensure they have all the information they need. We know that choosing a new school can be a daunting experience, so we are on hand to guide and support parents through the process, and make it as stress-free as possible.

How do marketing and communications play a role?

There are many stakeholders invested in the Schools - from prospective parents, current parents and pupils, to Governors, staff and Allanians - and we need to ensure we build and retain relationships with them all. It's important that we communicate efficiently and effectively, to help develop, support and fulfil the vision for the future of the Schools.

There are so many stories to tell, from the opening of the Jubilee Building to the reindeer visit at the Junior School, and we need to be able to talk about the wonderful things staff, pupils, and parents contribute to our community.

Are there challenges?

Covid, of course, brought with it some difficulties. It was very hard not to be able to welcome families to the Schools faceto-face, so we had to change the way we worked. Our open mornings, for example, had to become virtual events, with live Q&As online. While we couldn't give our usual warm welcome in school, we did post out packs of tea, coffee and biscuits to those who registered, so they could enjoy the event in the comfort of their own home!

The main challenge is the size of the role, and making sure everything across admissions, communications and marketing is coordinated. It's important that as a team, we know what is going on, who is working on what, and how we can support one another.

It sounds busy: Very! There's no such thing as a typical day here... we could be dealing with anything from open mornings and new parents' meetings, to arranging a photoshoot with our pupils for the latest advertising campaign or sharing a good news story with the press.



Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

Whilst the 2005 introduction of e-cigarettes in the UK was heralded as a positive harm reduction tool for smokers, a recent survey by the NHS (Sept 2022) highlights the unintended consequence of that invention: 9% of 11 to 15 year olds are currently using e-cigarettes. Zoe Shuttleworth, Director of 'It Happens Education' delivered an informative and thought provoking "Vaping Deep Dive" session to all pupils in Years 9-11, on November 18 as part of our PSHEE offering. Zoe explained that some of the most popular 'preloaded' vapes contain as much nicotine as 20 cigarettes per day. Pupils learned of the highly addictive nature of nicotine and were warned that the long term health risks of vaping are still unknown: particularly that the chemical flavourings used to deliberately attract young people to vaping have not been tested for human consumption in this context. Pupils were reminded that UK law states it's illegal to sell any tobacco products including vapes, to someone under 18, a message reinforced by the prohibition of the use of 'vapes' on the Schools' premises, during an organised school activity or whilst in school uniform. A key theme of the session was to support pupils in making informed decisions and to empower them to resist peer pressure. One suggestion was 'The X Plan' - a prearranged agreement with a family member where a child texts an 'X' or agreed emoji home, as a sign that they need to discreetly leave an event. This 'no questions asked' exit strategy helps the child to remove themselves from a difficult situation without losing social face, a concept that was well-received by the pupils.
