National Careers Week

The Junior School had plenty going on too with a 'day in the life of' talks from parents working in a range of careers, from dentists and pilots to barristers and electricians.







International Women's Day

For International Women's Day on 8 March a group of Year 10 girls attended the Women and Girls in Engineering event hosted by Newcastle University. They took part in a range of engineering activities and spoke to current undergraduates about the variety of engineering courses available. They heard from four guest speakers about their journey into engineering: Priscila Melo who specialises in the development of biomaterials for regenerative medicine and tissue engineering, Victoria Liddle who works for Envision, a world leading battery technology company, Sharon Velasquez-Orta who researches novel microbial waste transformation, and Tessa O'Hara who works around the world as a lead engineer to provide shelter and sanitation following environmental disasters or warfare.

Charity and Fundraising

To mark one year since the start of the conflict in Ukraine and one month since the devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria, we had a non-uniform day at the senior school on 3 March to raise money for Save the Children. Each pupil and staff member donated £1 to wear their own clothes and we raised £1027.43.

We also had a non-uniform day at our Junior School on 17 March in aid of Comic Relief and raised £991.80.

Sports round up

In rugby our U15s played brilliantly in the National Schools Cup Vase competition, reaching the semi-final. Dame Allan's hosted the U18 Dame Allan's 7s for the second year running with 12 schools attending the event. Our U12 girls team played their first ever fixture and won the inaugural girls 7s tournament. Plus, the very first Dame Allan's rugby team played in the Rosslyn Park National Schools 7s tournament and our U14 team managed to reach the Rosslyn Park Plate Final! An excellent effort from all.

Well done to our Dame Allan's rowers who took part in the National Junior Indoor Rowing Championships in Leeds this halfterm. Oscar and Jamie in Year 13, won Gold and Silver, Leah in Year 7 and James in Year 11, won Bronze. Tom in Year 9 and Isabel in Year 10 came a close fourth place and our Year 9 relay team gave a great performance to achieve second place. Well done everyone!



At the Juniors our UII boys put in a great performance on I March to win the HMC football competition. They defended superbly throughout the tournament and kept their composure to win the final on penalties. They are the first Dame Allan's team to win this competition. The UII Girls football team also took part and finished second place overall. At the Seniors, our UI5 and UI6 teams reached the semi-final of the city cup, showing great resilience and spirit throughout. Our UI8 boys football team reached the cup final vs Jesmond Park Academy.





The whole school house cross-country tournament took place in a chilly Healey with Brewers and Bede coming out on top with a score of 621. Well done to all who took part! Congratulations to Year 10 pupils Annie and Poppy who represented the North East at the Inter Counties British Cross Country Championships in Loughborough this term.



Lots of netball fixtures were played this season with fantastic performances across the school. Our UI2s won the TWSSA tournament, our UI4s came third in the City Tournament and Year 13 Evie represented the U19 regional team playing against Scotland.

Our squash teams are doing really well too, with our KS3 boys and girls teams as well as KS4 boys qualifying for the National Plate Finals. In addition to this KS5 girls have qualified for the National Schools Cup Finals.

Finally, our basketball teams have done really well this half term with our UI4s joining our UI3 and UI6 teams in becoming Tyneside Cup Champions in their category.

In conversation with... Lyndsey Anderson, Catering Manager.

Tell us about your role and the wider department...

I head up a team of around 21 staff who cook and serve a selection of balanced, healthy meals to pupils and staff every day. I create a two week rolling meal plan as well as themed meals for key times of year including Burns' Night, Chinese New Year and Valentine's Day. All our produce is locally sourced and we recycle our food waste too.

Tell us more about your locally sourced ingredients...

Our eggs come from Lintz Hall in Burnopfield, less than half an hour from school. They are free-range and RSPCA assured. The fish for our popular 'Fish & Chip Fridays' come from Collingwood Seafood on North Shields fish quay and our chips come from a farm in Wooler, just 46 miles from field to door. The meat we use is reared in Northumberland and County Durham and the bread we use is baked daily at an artisan bakery just 12 miles away. It's important for us to use locally sourced produce to support local industries and reduce our carbon footprint. It's inevitable we produce some waste and we tackle that by recycling it to become renewable resources, animal feed and fertiliser.



How many meals do you need to prepare each day?

Around 1,200. There's lots of hungry mouths to feed across the senior and junior school. We also make bacon butties at breaktime which are a popular choice amongst our Year 10 and 11 boys.

Are there any special meals you need to prepare?

We are a nut free school so all meals are nut free. We have pupils with an array of allergies, intolerances and diabetics which we create bespoke meals plans for to accommodate. I contact pupils directly with their meal plans so they are aware of what they will be eating throughout the week.

Any challenges?

Gaining a constant level of supplies this year has been a challenge, just as supermarkets have struggled to stock their shelves we have found it a daily battle to get any sort of consistency when ordering goods in.

Your favourite meal?

Pie day has to be my favourite!

World Book Day

On 2 March our Junior School dressed up in an array of book characters as we celebrated our annual World Book Day, an international celebration of literature.

Children took part in a variety of different book-related activities, including 'Bringing Books to Life' dance workshops for Years 3 and 4, featuring Alice and Wonderland and Coraline. Meanwhile, Years 1 and 2 enjoyed their story journeys: Magical Airways workshops. Pupils in Years 3-6 were thoroughly entertained and inspired by author Abi Elphinstone in what was a super end to a busy week.

At the Senior School, some of our teachers transformed into book characters for pupils to guess. World Book Day was integrated into most lessons too, with pupils listening to recordings of Nobel Prize winning poet, Seamus Heaney in their English lessons, exploring Richard Dawkin's book Science in the Soul, in science lessons, and hearing Hilary Mantel speak about her recreation of a 16th century world in her novel The Mirror and the Light. ESU Public Speaking Final

Congratulations to our public speaking team, who represented Dame Allan's in the regional final of the ESU-Churchill Public Speaking Competition on Saturday II March.

Having been awarded 'best speaker' in the last round, Issy (Year 11), chose a particularly topical subject, exploring whether trade unions are still important in today's society. As in the previous rounds, the judges were impressed by the depth of Issy's knowledge, which also enabled her to respond to questions thoughtfully and thoroughly. In addition, they were delighted by her ability to diffuse more serious lines of thought with humour.

Erin (Year II) was praised for her calm, professional approach to chairing. The judges felt she put not only the speaker assigned to her team but the whole audience at ease, preparing us for the talk and summarising it in a way that showed real maturity and understanding.

Likewise, the judges praised James (Year 10) for his calm yet challenging questioning style. They felt that he used his genuine interest in the topic to ask thoughtful questions and follow-up questions which enabled the speaker to develop their ideas further.

We are very proud of the team, the second Dame Allan's team to reach the regional final, having competed against strong teams from other schools in the first two rounds. This is an impressive feat in itself, but is especially noteworthy as only Issy had taken part in the competition before. Our other team members, Masa (Year 9), Seb (Year 10) and Ethan (Year 10) also did brilliantly to reach round two of the competition.
