

Nursery pupils took the lead from Jackson Pollock, using his 'drip technique' of pouring or splashing liquid household paint onto a horizontal surface. The focus of the North East theme also was varied for each year group, with younger pupils showcasing their houses and iconic landmarks like the Tyne Bridge, whilst older pupils focused on shipbuilders and miners as a nod to the region's heritage, plus a display of beloved North East celebrities (we spotted lots of football tributes!).

In conversation with... Andrew Moore, Facilities Manager.

Tell us about your role and the wider department...

The Facilities Manager role is wide ranging and varied. It covers day-to-day operations like cleaning, site security, transport and waste disposal, together with building maintenance and the upkeep of the grounds. I'm supported by the Estates team in carrying out these duties; two Caretakers at the Senior School, a Caretaker at the Junior School and two Groundskeepers.

A growing part of my job is monitoring energy use and considering carbon reduction - how can we minimise our fossil fuel consumption and use green energies? I'm also able to provide health and safety support and advice.

Staff and pupils will have noticed some building work taking place on site at the Senior School recently, can you tell us a bit more about what is happening?

The contractors working on site at the moment are extending the Queen's Building, the Sixth Form centre, to accommodate the larger year groups that are currently coming through the school. When the work is completed, there will be larger study spaces for Sixth Form students, a new café, meeting rooms, and staff offices.



The temporary cabin that has been installed on the edge of the playing fields is to house current Sixth Form students, whilst the building work is ongoing. There will also be six temporary classrooms installed over the summer holidays.

Coordinating building work in a busy school must be tricky! What's the most challenging part of your role?

The trickiest part of my job is the logistics of organising work with minimum disruption to staff and pupils. Sometimes that means carrying out work after 4pm on an evening, or bigger jobs have to wait until school holidays. Obviously, major projects have to be coordinated with the school timetable and we need to segregate pupils and contractors for safeguarding and health and safety. Unfortunately, that can mean that there is disruption and noise throughout the school day, but myself and my team work very hard to keep this to a minimum.

What part of your job do you like the best?

I've always enjoyed the fact that every day can be different. Also the fact that I deal with a wide selection of staff around the Schools.

Coronation

Eating Disorder Awareness

Our pastoral staff recently received an informative training session from Maria Lavelle from Eating Distress North East (EDNE), a local charity which provides counselling, workshops and information for individuals, friends and families affected by eating disorders.

As well as raising awareness of the various types of disordered eating, Maria offered excellent advice on the importance of the language we use around food. The labelling of food by diet culture into "good" and "bad" can encourage fixed rules and unhealthy behaviours. Whilst following guidelines can help to maintain a healthy lifestyle, rigid rules can lead to inflexible behaviours and thoughts such as 'l must never eat sugar'. This can lead to individuals feeling like a failure when they break their own rules. Gently challenging these thoughts by encouraging the replacing of 'shoulds' and 'musts' with "could" or "can sometimes" can help to challenge this 'all or nothing' way of thinking.

Disrupted eating often starts as a strategy for young people to regain control, rather than as a way of achieving a desired look, and can develop into an everyday struggle which impacts work, health and relationships. Eating distress and disorders are serious emotional and physical problems and it is important to seek help and support as soon as possible to promote recovery. If you are concerned about your child's relationship with food, please get in touch with your child's Head of Year or Mrs Procter, the school nurse, for advice.
