

In conversation with... Dr Smith, AI Lead and Physics Teacher

Why do you think is it important for Schools to have an AI lead?

I think it is important for schools to have and AI Lead as AI is everywhere now, across every walk of life - just think about the phone in your pocket, which likely has some form of AI. It's becoming 'the norm' to embed into new technology and it is important that as educators we are proactive and up-to-date with this tech.

It's a new horizon for a lot of people, staff and pupils included, so it is something that we all have to learn and grow alongside. My role as AI Lead at Dame Allan's Schools is brand new, and with that comes the flexibility to move forward and shape the role and the learning I can offer to help staff and pupils to get the best out of AI.

What do you think is the biggest opportunity offered by AI in education?

I think the biggest opportunity offered by AI in schools is increased efficiency and timesaving for staff. Teachers can use it to streamline the admin-heavy aspects of their job - such as lesson planning and report writing - freeing up more time for the more human, pastoral parts of their role. This means more spending time with pupils and helping them to learn and flourish, and less time battling with word documents! We've started with Quillbot, a paraphrasing tool which helps with writing and grammar suggestions.

It will of course never replace the human input into planning and report writing. Al still needs prompts and information in order to generate effective solutions, but it will offer a really good support.

What do you think is the biggest threat posed by AI in an educational setting?

The biggest and most obvious threat is pupils using AI for homework, such as writing essays. It is, however, still quite easy to spot, teachers can tell when a piece of work doesn't 'sound' like a pupil's voice. However, it is definitely something to keep an eye on, especially as AI continues to develop. The temptation is for pupils (and teachers) to potentially use AI as a 'crutch', which we want to avoid. It's very much a support tool, rather than a replacement for the human aspect of education.

Can you offer a little background as to why you were interested in taking the AI Lead role, any prior experience that links back to it?

Digital tech has always been a hobby of mine, programming and coding was actually part of my PhD. I like to play with computers and I am fascinated by machine learning, so the role was a great fit for me.

How will you be guiding the staff at Dame Allan's with regards to AI use going forward?

I will be holding regular staff training sessions and supporting them with their professional development with regards to AI. I want to help Dame Allan's staff access as many AI tools as I can to help make their jobs a little more streamlined. AI education at Dame Allan's will very much be embedded within staff training.



It's been really encouraging to see all staff willing to give AI a go!

Pupils will also be involved, I'll be offering Al training with ideas that they can use throughout their learning. I'll also be spreading the word about the latest in Al developments via pupil announcement, a new Al website, and assemblies.

Personally, what is your favourite use of AI?

I actually used AI (ChatGPT) to aid with writing my letter of application for this role, it gives a great framework!

Outside of my teaching role, I also run a Dungeons and Dragons Club at Dame Allan's, and ChatGPT has also been useful in helping me to plan campaigns for this, as well as develop characters, which in turn makes the club more engaging for the pupils that attend.

The Lectures

The second series of our pioneering speaker series, The Lectures, returned this half term to great success. In October, we welcomed bestselling author and podcaster Damian Hughes, who spoke about the significance of learning from failures. Most recently, we welcomed Jonathan Warburton, of bakery fame, who spoke about his family's business history, his iconic ad campaigns, and the power of having a focus.

Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

As Christmas approaches, our attention is drawn to 'winter wellbeing' from the benefits of Hygge to the joys of simple pleasures: our Sixth Form peer mentors have given assemblies on staying mentally well this winter, including the importance of staying connected, keeping to a routine and spending time outdoors. With seasonal illnesses on the rise, Mrs Procter, the school nurse, would like to remind you of the need to keep children at home if they are too unwell to attend school, particularly if they have symptoms of fever, diarrhoea or vomiting. There has also been an increase in cases of measles in the community so please ensure that your child has had their MMR vaccination: you can contact your child's GP for further information about this.

This half term, our Year 12 students received an informative 'safer driving' workshop, delivered by former police officer, Dennis Shotton, to highlight the particular risks for novice drivers on the roads. According to Brake, the road safety charity, 1 in 5 drivers crash within a year of passing their test, whilst over 1500 young drivers are killed or seriously injured on UK roads every year. Please may we remind parents that Sixth Form students who wish to use their own cars may only do so to travel to and from school. Passengers may only be carried with the express permission of the parents or guardians of the other student(s). We ask that all cars are registered with school and that students drive with care and consideration for our neighbours, as well as park respectfully.

On a practical safeguarding note, Senior School pupils should not be on site before 07:45 due to there being a lack of supervision at this time. If on occasion circumstances arise that mean arrival before 07:45 is unavoidable, pupils must go to the dining hall.
