Martha said: "The Cosy Snug is nice, it has lots of art supplies so you can draw something and Play-Doh to play with. It is a good place to go if you need someone or some quiet. If you don't talk about your feelings you can get poorly, so talking about it helps us to have a better time at school."

Joseph is a big fan of Poppy, and has handcrafted her a dog house out of card. He said: "When I stroke Poppy, she makes me feel safe. I think the Cosy Snug is a really good thing for the school."

In conversation with... Mrs Kristy Clark, Head of Drama

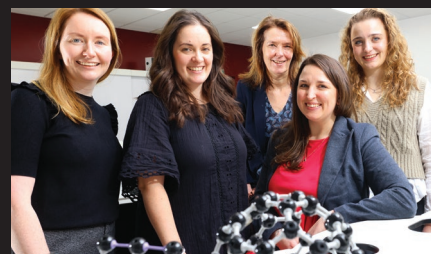

Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

Children's Mental Health Week (5-9 February) was based around the theme 'my voice matters'. As you'll have read, down at the Junior School we spotlighted our newest wellbeing space, the Cosy Snug. At the Senior School, pupils in Years 7-9 marked the occasion with an assembly inspiring them to use their voices to support others, drawing on Greta Thunberg's statement: 'you are never too small to make a difference'. Whether it is through raising awareness of an issue through debating, participation in a society such as FemSoc or EcoPanel, or speaking up for another

pupil, our young people regularly make their voices heard and are listened to by staff.

Our School Council used their voice last term to request an anonymous reporting tool, Whisper, to alert our pastoral staff to any issues or concerns they may be having via text or email. Whilst we hope that all our pupils feel able to speak to any member of staff directly about a problem that they may be experiencing, we hope that this new anonymous reporting tool, launching next half term in the Senior School, will be an additional way for pupils to make their voices heard.

Pupils in Years 10 and 11 were invited to consider potential barriers to speaking up during form time discussions, focusing on the advantages and disadvantages of social media in recognition of Safer Internet Day. For our young people, 'inspiring change, making a difference, managing influence and navigating change online', the theme of the campaign this year, is no easy feat, but our PSHE curriculum is designed to provide our pupils with the tools they need to manage their relationships both online and in the real world.
