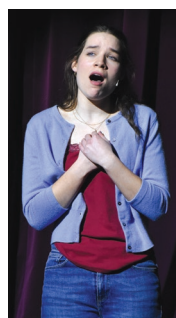
## High School Musical hits the right note

As we approach the long Easter weekend and holidays, many of us will be looking forward to celebrating and relaxing with friends and family. Happy egg hunting!

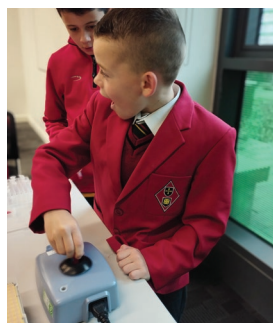


# National Careers Week

## Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

### **A recent initiative from Northumbria Police has seen them visiting local schools - including Dame Allan's Junior School - to introduce themselves to the pupils and cement the important role of the police within our communities.**

As well as being on call for harmful or dangerous incidents, the police play a large role in helping to safeguard young people, and integration with schools can be a powerful tool in doing so. One of their key areas of focus are County Lines gangs, where organised criminal groups target, recruit, and exploit children and young people to transport and sell drugs.

The police can help disrupt this activity by spotting the signs and reporting concerns if we notice something isn't quite right, and families can also do their bit to spot warning signs.

County Lines activity tends to come in three stages: target, test, and trap.

- At the target stage, criminals will watch an area where lots of children come and go - like a school - to spot anyone who looks vulnerable. They will then strike up a friendship and build trust.
- The next stage is test, where the criminal will offer money, trainers, or a phone to make the child feel special and part of the gang. They then test this loyalty by asking the child to run a small errand, or hold onto items for them.
- The final stage is trap, where the gang will isolate the child from their friends and family, using threats and blackmail to maintain their control.

At Dame Allan's, pupils are given age-friendly information on how to stay safe and avoid such dangers - such as not engaging with strangers, warning signs within their peer group, and channels to report any uncomfortable interactions to. You also can help protect your child by being curious about their friendship groups, knowing where they are when they are not at home or school, and identifying any new or expensive 'gifts' they may have received.

Resources from charities such as Childline can also be invaluable, and our pastoral team are always here to support you and your child.
